

PARTNERSHIP MISSIONS IN ALASKA

A small church in Alaska has undertaken a big task—a church replant under the leadership of their bivocational pastor. And the Alaska Baptist Convention's connection with Alabama is playing a surprising role.

One day, State Missionary Scotty Goldman's counterpart in Alaska told him about the little church with a big heart. Scotty asked him to "dream big" about what could help. His answer was for someone gifted in evangelism, church revitalization, discipleship, community outreach and construction to come help for six months. Both men laughed and agreed that was guite a dream.

But God makes dreams come true. State Missionary Jamie Baldwin had just retired, and his skillset checked all those boxes. Surprising even himself, Jamie accepted the call to work with Liberty Church in Craig, Alaska. Now, he's bringing teams from Alabama to help out too.

Scotty said Jamie's willingness to use his skills to accomplish God's plan is inspiring. "Many Alabama Baptists could do similar things. Maybe not for six months but for three. Maybe not replanting a church but working at a camp. The possibilities are abundant," he said. "God only needs a willing heart."

ROB JACKSON LEADS OFFICE OF CHURCH HEALTH

The pandemic amplified the special challenges of many congregations that have plateaued or are in decline. But help is on the way, and there is fresh hope for those who need intentional prayer and coaching.

The State Board of Missions recently created a new Office of Church Health, which will have a singular focus on church revitalization and church health for Alabama Baptist congregations. State Missionary Rob Jackson was tapped to serve as office director.

Rob once studied to be a pharmacist, but God had plans for him to focus on *spiritual* health instead of physical remedies. With a heart for the local church, Rob has previously served as a state missionary in the Office of Evangelism and as a pastor in Alabama and Kentucky.

When he was unanimously called to lead this new office, Rob said that more than anything he wants "to see healthy churches become healthier and unhealthy churches to become healthy." He is energetic and hopeful, ready to see the "power of the Spirit of God" on display as the Lord brings true revitalization to struggling churches around our state

DISASTER RELIEF VOLUNTEER SHIRLEY LOEWEN

What comes to mind when you hear "Disaster Relief"? It's often caring volunteers performing hands-on work immediately after a storm. Or perhaps chaplains praying for the survivors or cooks providing food. But the *Yellow Shirt Army* is made of more than those on the frontlines.

Consider how important it is to have good data when managing a disaster response. That's where volunteers like Shirley Loewen shine. An accomplished project manager with experience in IT and account management, Shirley uses her unique skillset behind the scenes.

Last year, she spent countless hours cleaning and managing the volunteer database, migrating it from one platform to another and organizing shared documents to streamline the process. "It was a labor-intensive project but so worth the effort," she said. "I'm the one blessed by serving. If I've helped someone else, that's just icing on the cake."

State Missionary Mark Wakefield said Shirley is a great example of someone using their career skills and applying them to a volunteer ministry with DR. "I'm so glad the Lord gifts each person differently. It definitely takes all of us," he said.

DISASTER RELIEF VOLUNTEER JOHN HAYES

For nearly a quarter of a century, John Hayes has used his chainsaw to clear trees from storm-battered homes. But the joy he gets from volunteering with Alabama Baptist Disaster Relief's *Yellow Shirt Army* comes from lifting more than debris. He's all about lifting the name of Jesus.

John has amazing stories from his time in Disaster Relief; yet all stem from <u>THE</u> story of salvation through Christ alone. "The most valuable thing I've learned is Jesus doesn't expect me to save anybody. I just tell the story. Because I know if I do that, He'll do the rest," John said.

John longs for more people to be trained and ready to share the Gospel story through Disaster Relief. "All you have to do is make yourself available, and God will use you in ways you never imagined," he said.

ALABAMA WMU'S GREAT COMMISSION CONVERSATIONS

Shortly after the COVID-19 pandemic started, Alabama WMU began hosting an online missions gathering called Great Commission Conversations (GCC). The goal is to get close and personal with missions through intimate conversations with real, live missionaries.

Through the Zoom platform, missionaries from all over the world have given keen insight into how God is working in nearly every affinity group of the IMB and of North America. Guests share about family, work and stories of their people. Participants ask questions, and then the group prays together.

Alabama WMU Executive Director Candace McIntosh said the impact has been wide reaching. "GCC has not only made our missionaries seem like friends to the men and women who join the conversations, it has offered much-needed encouragement to our missions personnel who have found themselves in a challenging place during this unique time in history," she said.

The GCCs have been so powerful and effective, they will continue beyond the pandemic. Each month, participants become better "pray-ers," and missionaries are reminded of the love and support they have from Alabama Baptists.

CHURCH AT THE OAKS

Far from his home in New Jersey, a college student named Matthew was all alone in the "COVID dorm" at the University of Alabama. He now thanks God for that difficult sickness, for it brought true healing to his heart.

Matthew received a "COVID care bag" that UA Baptist Campus Ministries (BCM) provided to quarantined students. It included a snack from a local WMU group, a connection card and other useful items. He responded to the card, and a student from BCM followed up with him.

Matthew began weekly discipleship with BCM, where he learned of a new church plant specifically designed to give students deep spiritual roots and inspiring outward reach. He found a spiritual home at Church at the Oaks, where he accepted Christ as Savior and was one of their first-ever baptisms earlier this year.

Pastor Britton Latham said Matthew's story reveals the need for workers to bring in the spiritual harvest. "There are so many students who are hungry for God," he said. "We just have to be faithful to obey His call to share the Gospel with them."

- Each morning at 10:02am, Pastor Britton prays Luke 10:2 over his church. Join him in asking the Lord of the Harvest to send mature Christian workers to help in the leadership of Church at the Oaks.
- Pray that more associations and churches would partner with, encourage and send out planters to the harvest fields in Alabama.
